#### **New Board Members**

Kelly Eggleston grew up just over the hill in Gorham. However, she has always had a close connection to Randolph, as she spent a great deal of time throughout her childhood at her grandparents, Auvie and Judy Kenison's. Some of her earliest memories of Randolph include watching the helicopter fly supplies up to the huts, swimming in her grandparents' pond, and squashing "potato bugs" (yuck!). Kelly lives with her husband Joe, in the home of what many likely remember as being occupied by Herbert and Helen Abbott. Kelly officially moved to Randolph in February 2008 and graduated from the University of Maine - Farmington (UMF) summa cum laude with a B.A. in Geography in May 2008.

While at UMF pursuing her degree, Kelly dabbled in environmental science and geographic information systems (GIS) courses and enjoyed both immensely. Shortly after graduation, Kelly applied for an internship with the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and began her adventure with NRCS in October 2008. In that role, she put her mapping skills to good use. Now, almost 10 years later, she serves as the District Conservationist for Coos County. This is a position she was hired for in March 2016. When not working, Kelly enjoys spending time with family, gardening, hiking, exploring all that northern New England has to offer, and occasionally traveling when time allows.

Gary Newfield was born in Taunton, Massachusetts and graduated from UNH with a degree in Recreation and Park management in 1977. After his junior year at UNH he worked a summer as a back-country ranger with the Androscoggin Ranger District. This led to 4 more summers of the same. In between he taught cross-country skiing during the winters. In 1980, he began a 5-year hitch with the AMC on their construction crew. After his time there, he spent 10 years off and on working/teaching for Hurricane Island Outward Bound school based in Maine. In 1995, he became a registered nurse, settled down a bit, and today works as an RN in the emergency room at Dartmouth Hitchcock Hospital.

<u>Gaye Ruble</u> was born in Michigan, but grew up primarily in Georgia. She completed her undergraduate studies and obtained her DVM degree from the University of Georgia College of Veterinary Medicine. She married a classmate (David) who joined the US Army shortly after graduation, and thus began several years of relocation and multiple private practice jobs. After five years, she decided to continue her education and enrolled in a post-doctoral fellowship program in Laboratory Animal Medicine at Johns Hopkins University.

After completing the program and obtaining a Master's in Public Health, she took the "if you can't beat 'em, join 'em" approach and joined the Army as well. She supported biomedical research at several laboratories in the Washington DC area, with a final assignment in Bangkok, Thailand. In 2001, David retired from the military, she resigned her commission, and they moved to New Jersey, where she spent 15 years supporting drug development at a pharmaceutical company. In 2010, while vacationing in Jackson, NH, they visited friends in Randolph and fell in love with the area. They bought their retirement home and moved here permanently in December 2013. She is now retired and enjoys spending her free time hiking with her spouse and two dogs, puttering in her garden, and cooking.

## Celebration 2024 (Co-Chairs Guy Stever and Sarah Gallop)

The Town of Randolph will mark its 200<sup>th</sup> birthday in 2024. The Foundation has agreed to take the lead in planning a celebration fitting for the occasion. A kick-off Celebration 2024 meeting was held on Saturday August 11, where a preliminary list of projects and events were generated. A celebration framework is in the process of being developed.

Meanwhile, the 2<sup>nd</sup> Randolph Story Slam, co-sponsored by the Randolph Foundation and the Randolph Church, took place on Saturday, August 4. Nearly 80 people attended to hear 19 stories which are now posted on the Randolph Foundation's YouTube site. These stories are being collected as part of the bicentennial initiative.

# Ravine House Site/Durand Lake (Chair Phil Guiser, Bruce Kirmmse, Peter Rowan)

The pool and lake area seem to be in fine shape. Members of the Foundation and public toured the Lake's dam with Kelly Eggleston (our new Board member) and Ally Hook, both of the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service. Brendan Prusik of the UNH Extension Service led us on an inspection of the fields and woods around the lake/pool area. The findings in both cases are that the area seems to be well managed. There were some suggestions as to things to keep our eyes on and improvements to consider but no areas of immediate concern were identified. The Foundation made some landscaping improvements to the pool and lake area and oversaw the annual mowing.

Most noteworthy was the Town providing the resources to open the bathhouse for use during the swimming season. The pool area is being enjoyed by more people than any summer in recent history.

The volunteers who keep this area looking fine and functioning are too numerous to mention. But special thanks goes to Alison and Dave Tomlinson for overseeing and maintaining the tennis court, Jean Malick and Marcia Lee for keeping the Ravine House Site gardens looking beautiful, the RMC for maintaining the trails and bog bridges around the Lake area and Edith Tucker for sharing advice and historical perspective. Also, appreciation

goes to those who help control the beavers' impact, pick up any trash left by others, brush the paths, and just do whatever else needs to be done.

# Scholarships (Chair Angela Brown)

Since 1963, the Randolph Foundation has awarded scholarships to eligible Randolph residents to pursue their studies at the post-secondary level. The Foundation recognizes any courses at an accredited institution that provides undergraduate and/or graduate work. Undergraduate students who are officially enrolled in a course of study, upon submitting all needed application forms, will receive a base scholarship of \$1,700 annually, based on a 2-semester academic year full-time course of undergraduate study, not to exceed \$6,800. Beginning at the second term of the first year of study, an undergraduate whose GPA (grade point average) is 3.2 or higher for that semester will receive \$1,000 to be used for the following semester, based on a 2-semester academic year. Graduate students receive a flat scholarship of \$1,500 annually for a full-time course of graduate study not to exceed three (3) years.

# Finance (Chair Ben Phinney)

The value of the Foundation's investments at fiscal year ended June 30, 2018 were \$686,869 compared to \$716,252 at the same date in 2017. These figures are for the Foundation's assets invested with Janney Montgomery Scott and do not include receivables or cash on hand at Northway Bank. During the year, the Foundation transferred \$20,000 to the checking account at Northway Bank to partially fund the operating budget. Additionally, \$53,000 was withdrawn in April 2018 to fund the temporary purchase of real estate near the Mt. Crescent Trailhead. Proceeds from the Mt. Crescent Land Protection Campaign will be used to repay this.

The investment return for the portfolio for the fiscal year was 4.26% which compares with a blended return of 4.70%. Asset allocations at the fiscal year end were 64% equities and 36% fixed income securities and cash equivalents. Members of the Finance Committee

include Sarah Gallop, Phil Guiser, Angela Brown, and Ben Phinney. We continue to appreciate the excellent advice and service of Geoff Beringer, who manages the account at Janney Montgomery and Scott.

## Lifeline (Chair Heather Wiley)

Lifeline is a 24/7 service provided by New England Emergency Response System (NEERS) to provide both year-round and summer residents with a lightweight, waterproof button for emergency use. When the button is pushed, whether in your home or on your property, NEERS will call the client immediately and then call the designated emergency contact person or 911 if needed.

The Foundation provided eight residents with support this year. Please note that this safety device is now provided at no cost to the resident – the Randolph Foundation pays half the monthly fee and the town of Randolph pays the other half. Clients do not have to have a landline to avail of this service – it can also be hooked up to a cell phone.

The Foundation had budgeted significantly more for Lifeline this fiscal year. Please encourage your elderly or disabled friends and neighbors to avail of this excellent service! For more information and to sign up please contact Heather Wiley at 466-5179 or rcotnoir@ne.rr.com.



### Mt. Crescent Land Protection Campaign

In early 2018, the Randolph Foundation was presented with an opportunity to play a leadership role in protecting land in the Mt. Crescent environs. In keeping with its mission of promoting conservation and recreation, the Foundation teamed up with the Randolph Mountain Club to launch the Mt. Crescent Land Protection Campaign.

The Campaign focused on raising \$52,500 to purchase a sixteen-acre parcel of land at the foot of Mt. Crescent. That parcel is adjacent to the Community Forest Trailhead and is traversed by several RMC paths (see light green area in map below). Working with the Town, the goal is to add this land to the Randolph Community Forest, which will be a major step forward in protecting the area from development. A further opportunity to protect the Mt. Crescent area presented itself at an abutting parcel (see striped area in map). The campaign committee worked with the owner to negotiate a \$26,000 purchase of a conservation easement on that land. This means that access to the three RMC trails and the Community Forest Trailhead on that parcel will be permanently protected from incompatible uses and/or future development.



Thanks to the generosity of 73 individuals and families (see next page), the Foundation raised the \$52,500 and the \$26,000, so that we can implement protections for both parcels of land. The Foundation will be following up with the Town of Randolph and other parties to execute these transactions. We could not have achieved this tremendous community success without each one of you — thank you to the entire Randolph community!

We are indebted to the campaign committee members who devoted themselves to this endeavor — Sarah Eusden Gallop, Sally Boothman Glines, Jamie Maddock, Randy Meiklejohn, Ben Phinney, and John Scarinza — and we thank them for their stewardship and leadership. We would also like to acknowledge the hard work of Randolph Foundation Treasurer Angela Brown and Secretary Sue Temme who together managed the contribution details.
